RIDING FOR CHANGE:

Show Jumping Meets Community Impact
at the 17th Annual Great Charity Challenge
sponsored by Fidelity Investments®

Great Charity Challenge sponsored by Fidelity Investments® (GCC) returns to Wellington International for its 17th year, once again showcasing the powerful intersection of sport, philanthropy, and community. Since its founding in 2009 by Mark and Paige Bellissimo, the GCC has grown into one of Palm Beach County's most impactful charitable events, distributing more than \$24 million to 370 nonprofit organizations serving the local community.

On Saturday, January 31, 2026, Wellington International will host an unforgettable evening of show jumping and charitable giving during the Winter Equestrian Festival. The event unites riders, donors, sponsors, and spectators for a high-energy night that celebrates generosity, creativity, and the shared goal of giving back.

A NIGHT OF COMPETITION, CREATIVITY, AND GIVING

With an ambitious goal of distributing \$2 million in a single evening, the 17th Annual GCC will support 34 Palm Beach County nonprofit organizations,

strengthening vital community programs and services.

The centerpiece of the evening is a relay-style jumping competition in which horses and riders compete in themed costumes, combining athleticism with entertainment. The winning team's designated charity will receive \$100,000, while every preselected nonprofit is guaranteed a minimum grant of \$15,000, ensuring meaningful impact for all participants.

General admission to the GCC is free, welcoming the entire community to experience the excitement. Families can enjoy a complimentary festival featuring face painting, a petting zoo, Venetian carousel rides, and a wide selection of food and beverage options.

Festivities in the International Arena begin with the inaugural Costume Relay Race, presented by the Postage Stamp Farm Foundation. This youth-focused competition highlights the GCC's commitment to "Doing Good at Any Age," with six teams

representing local nonprofits competing for \$55,000 in prize money.

Guests are also invited to explore the School Art Gallery, displayed along the Bridge, featuring creative works from 12 Wellington public schools—celebrating the artistic talents of local students.

POWERED BY COMMUNITY SUPPORT

The Great Charity Challenge is made possible through the generosity of donors and sponsors, including families, businesses, equestrians, and foundations. Contributions ranging from \$50 to \$100,000+ play a critical role in helping the event reach its fundraising goals and expand its community impact.

At Eye Candyland, a passion and love for horses has turned into a budding community built on support, creativity and putting the horse first. Erica Hatfield, owner and founder, started Team Eye Candy (TEC) out of pure love for the animals and the sport. With its development, TEC has put an emphasis on presenting the sport at the highest level by focusing on the importance of being prepared, polished and competitive.

"Team Eye Candy is a platform that uplifts others and not just the brand you see in the ring," said Jaqlyn Steinberger, the Event and Marketing Coordinator at TEC. With 22 events already scheduled for the winter season, TEC spotlights organizations that matter to its team and clients.

Throughout the years, Team Eye Candy has developed a large community and network of individuals who want to help and contribute. By doing their part in the community, they can spotlight the organizations that need the most attention. "There are tons of very big non-profits that everyone's aware of, and on the other hand, there are so many little ones that need our help. Those are the ones that need awareness

and need to come to light, especially in this community," continued Steinberger.

The decision to become involved in the Great Charity Challenge was an easy one. The GCC's mission naturally aligns with Team Eye Candy's—both organizations "prioritize inclusivity, giving back and using the sport as a vehicle for positive change."

"That obviously really speaks to us," exclaimed Steinberger. "The Great Charity Challenge reminds us why community matters just as much as competition.

Being involved is more like becoming part of something meaningful that reflects our values."

Known for their creativity and passion for fun, Team Eye Candy elevated the GCC theme last year with their costumes and a Mariachi band. This earned them a \$5,000 team spirit bonus, bringing their total raised to \$60,000 for Bella's Promise Pet Rescue Inc.

This year, expect Team Eye Candy to deliver a surprise while remaining polished, classy, and true to who they are.

LILLIE KEENAN IS FASTER IN NETJETS GRAND PRIX



In front of a home crowd, USA's Lillie Keenan and longtime partner Fasther took flight in a jump-off brimming with horse and rider talent to win the \$215,000 NetJets CSI4* Grand Prix, highlighting Saturday Night Lights during WEF 3.

A rising star with her sights set firmly on the 2026 World Championships, Keenan, 29, bested a field that included two Olympic champions and five of the world's top 10 over tracks set by Canadian course designer Peter Grant. A daring rollback to the third fence and a leave-out in the final line left Keenan and her 16-year-old Dutch

Warmblood gelding (Vigo d'Arsouilles STX x Farmer) the eventual victors by three-tenths of a second.

Irish Olympian Shane Sweetnam came the closest to Keenan's time of 40.56 seconds, narrowly missing top call with Spy Coast Farm's Rural Juror SCF—a nine-year-old Danish Warmblood by Presley Boy. He notched in at 40.87 seconds ahead of third-place finisher and Australian Olympian Thaisa Erwin. She piloted the 14-year-old Dutch-bred mare Hialita B, owned by Michael Smith.

"That final line was a risky moment, but I think it made



the biggest difference," said Keenan, who rides under the direction of six-time U.S. Olympian McLain Ward.

"He was the first horse that McLain selected for me and represents the important mentorship I have with him," continued Keenan of Fasther, owned by her own Chansonette Farm. "He's my heart horse—he has a fire inside of him; loves to jump, but he really loves to run. We struggled a lot at first with rideability, but I have grown up with him; I trust him so much, and he tries so hard for me."

The New York native continued about the bond she has formed with Fasther during their seven years together, saying, "There are

moments where I can go to a fence and think I should have ridden it better, and he turns himself inside out to jump it. He does that for me—I don't think he would do that just for anyone."

Only four weeks into the winter circuit at Wellington International and Keenan has already secured several impressive wins, including a CSI3* 1.50m blue aboard Chagrin d'Amour and a debut grand prix win with new mount Highway TN.

"Coming off of last year, I really wanted to try to ride the momentum," said Keenan. "I'm in an incredibly lucky position to have multiple horses that can jump at this level, but that didn't happen by chance—

I've planned and worked hard towards building the string. I have some older, very experienced horses, and then some young ones just stepping up. You build that over years, and I want to make the most of this moment."

In closing, Keenan noted that Wellington is a sentimental place for her to win at, saying, "It has become my home. I showed here for the first time when I was seven. Now I'm 29 in this ring—it feels special."

ERYNN BALLARD & LUCIANA LOSSIO CLOSE OUT WEF 3

Canadian Olympian Erynn Ballard currently holds a hot hand; she has won at least once every week since November. Adding to her tally, she topped the \$62,500 Hermès

CSI4* 1.50m Classic aboard Chatadel PS, owned by Jose Pablo Salgado and Ilan Ferder. Less than a second slower than Ballard, Mimi Gochman

(USA) took second with Incen BH, an 11-year-old Austrian Warmblood gelding, owned by DG Sport Horse. Six-time U.S. Olympian McLain Ward and Lestro VD Valckenborg, a 10-year-old Dutch Warmblood owned by Marta Mattox, closed out the podium in third.

Ballard said she and her team have been patiently waiting for Chatadel PS (Chacoan Blue X Conthargos) to turn nine. And this year, the wait is over for the Oldenburg stallion.

"We have had him since he was seven and have been developing him," said Ballard of the mount purchased from an auction in Mexico by Salgado. "He finished last season winning his first two-star grand prix—he's a winner, and I think for a young horse, we did everything perfectly. He

did the youngster tour at Aachen, and without over-jumping him, he has seen the world. I'm really proud of the way we have developed him.

"To have a horse this long is unusual, and we have created a bond with him that shows in the results," continued Ballard.

Of her recent win streak, Ballard said, "To manifest these kinds of results at every single show for eight horse shows in a row, that's mega. It shows the consistency in our program and in our horses. There's a depth in our string that was created by good management, and it's exciting."

Brazil's Luciana Lossio and her mare Lady Louise Jmen made a lively return to U.S. soil to take the win in

the \$62,500 Florida Coast Equipment CSI2* Grand Prix.

"We took some time off, and this was our first big show for us," said Lossio, who won a five-star grand prix with Lady Louise during the 2024 WEF season. "We'll stay for the rest of the season and work on moving up. The goal is to qualify for the four-star and five-star classes."

Lady Louise, a Brazilian-bred mare, had no problem making light work of Canadian course designer Peter Grant's track. Not far from the winning pair was Amy Millar (CAN). She finished second with Christiano, a 16-year-old Dutch-bred gelding, for owners Future Adventures.

Jonathan Corrigan (IRL) took third with Darius De Kerglenn, a 13-year-old gelding.

Bought as a six-year-old, the now 15-year-old Lady Louise

has brought Lossio places she never expected to go.


"We found her in the middle of nowhere in Brazil. I went to see her; I liked her, so we brought her in originally to do the 1.20m.

"At the time, I didn't want to jump any more than that," said Lossio. "But she made me believe that I could jump more. She's shown me the world. We had great seasons here, and we've been to Europe together. This mare is everything to me."

As an amateur rider and a full-time lawyer in Brazil, Lossio will travel to Wellington weekly throughout the season to compete. Thanks to the support of her husband and fellow amateur rider Rodrigo Cunha, the pair hope to see Lady Louise back in the Saturday Night Lights spotlight soon.



CORENTIN TUAL DEFIES THE ODDS TO BECOME A TOP GROOM

France's Corentin Tual's prestigious position as barn manager and head groom to USA's Lillie Keenan was not a role that he was born into. In fact, it began by chance. During his childhood, a friend of his became interested in riding, and Tual followed suit.

"I saw something, and then I tried it, and I loved it," Tual said. "It was kind of by accident."

Now 31, Tual has gone from a non-equestrian family background to the top of the sport. His career took off almost a decade ago, when he moved to the U.S. to learn English and secured a placement at a high-performance show jumping barn.

"I think that was the moment when things got very serious," he said of arriving in Florida in 2018. "I wanted to travel to learn English, and then this is where I end up."

His resume reveals a career trajectory via top barns

on both sides of the pond, before settling in the USA six years ago with Keenan. With nine horses to look after, Tual and three grooms share the responsibility collectively. "We all do everything," Tual said. "I like to see all of the horses. That way, when I'm on the road, it's easier to manage them."

Tual approaches his role with subjectivity regarding the different ages and demands of the horses in his care. Two seasoned campaigners—both 16 years old—are at the heart of Keenan's string; Faster, who claimed victory in the Saturday Night Lights NetJets CSI4* Grand Prix, and 2022 World Championship mount Argan de Beliard.

"With the older ones, it takes a little longer," said Tual. "Lots of stretching, laser, magnetic therapy. We take our time."

Tual believes in routine and knows that experienced horses can sense the importance of an event. "When they're 16 years old, they know exactly what they have to do," he said. Faster's preparation on Saturday quickly put him in the zone. "When you braid him, he knows what's going on," he said. "He's very focused. He drinks, he eats a little bit and then he rests."

Faster's awareness extended to the presentation and the lap of honor where the veteran gelding accelerated like a youngster on the final turn.

"I wonder what he would have done if he had come second," Tual said. "Because I had a horse once who knew the difference. If he was winning, you could do anything you wanted to him after the class. If he was second, you couldn't touch him."

Important events are on the horizon for Keenan and her team, including Los Angeles in 2028. "This is not just a hobby," Tual said. "We are taking care of horses, and we want to go to the Olympics. We have sports goals."

Routine and professionalism aside, Tual has a deep emotional investment in his work and the way his horses feel. "I'm really happy when they succeed," he said. "I feel they're very happy about it too."

Despite his family's lack of involvement with horses, Tual's mother, Claudine, who was once afraid of horses, is now a dedicated show jumping fan. "She follows the rider, and she's got a couple of favorites," said Tual.

Tual has made it to the top of the sport against the odds. He encourages others to do the same with a proviso. "You have really got to be committed, and you really have to love horses," he said. "That's very important because if you don't, there's no chance you're going to be able to do it. But what I always say is, 'if you really want to do this, you just have to do it.'"
